

# St. Mary's Boar's Head Festival a gift to all

St. Mary's has been offering the Boar's Head Festival as its annual gift to the city of Kinston since 1990, the 650th anniversary of the festival. This Boar's Head tradition originated at Queen's College, Oxford, England, in 1340, and is probably the oldest continuing festival of the Christmas season.

One moment, merry teenagers are skipping down the church aisle, the next, the Three Wise Men are making their slow progress toward the altar. The Boar's Head Festival is a moving mix of mischiefs and grandeur, telling a tale right out of the Middle Ages.

The performances are at 3:00 and 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, January 11, 2015 and mark St. Mary's 26th retelling of the tale. Entrance is free and open to everyone.

Approximately 150 people dress up as peasants and nobility, as beggars and kings, for the spectacle's two performances. They bring the ancient morality play to life, the triumph of good over evil, with plenty of music, costumes and pageantry. And yes, jesters and jugglers may very well hop over you or tickle you with feathers.

The head of a real boar, an animal which once terrorized people in the forests of Europe, is carried high for all to see. The pageant of killing the boar is ancient: The Romans served

boar as the first course at their banquets. As Europe became Christianized, the boar continued on the plates at medieval feasts, but the message was different. Now, the procession of the boar's head meant that evil had been destroyed by the power of the Christ Child.

The musicians and choir set the feast's tone, sometimes somber, sometimes having a little fun. British Beefeaters march in to begin the festival and soon the giant boar's head arrives to its own carol. A long, gift-laden company trails behind the beast, including King Wenceslas and the Plum Pudding Company. Soon the audience is invited to chorus in on "Deck the Halls," "Good King Wenceslas" and "We Three Kings." The plum pudding and mince pie look delicious.

Next, darling little waits, some of the youngest children of the congregation, prance in with their green-andred costumes to accompany the massive Yule log. Waits were a castle's guards-in-training, who marked the hours and days as part of their job. Shepherds enter with live animals and start to follow a star. They're soon joined by three kings, and all stand reverence and humility before "The Holy Family".

Everyone files out to "O Come All Ye Faithful," and the doors close on a remarkable glimpse into the Middle Ages and the beautiful mystery of Immanuel–God With Us–for another year.

Following the 5:00 p.m. performance a banquet of delightful faire is offered. For the banquet you will need to purchase a ticket, which costs \$40 per person. The banquet offers a full meal of wonderful offerings set in the king's hall with decorations and wine is offered. To purchase your ticket, contact the church at 252-523-6146.

# From the Rector - Father Michael Singer

### Can you tell your story?

When driving through Kinston, or almost any community in many parts of the world, you'll find homes decorated for Christmas. Almost all of those homes, in one fashion or another, will have a Christmas tree.

It can be an arduous task selecting the family Christmas tree. At different stages of my life, my family and I have climbed hillsides in the snow and frigid cold to select the perfect tree, spending an hour sawing on it and dragging it down the hillside. We've also stopped to buy one from a vendor at a road side stand. One year we were so late selecting a tree, we stopped by the local grocery store to get one of only five remaining. The Singer family Christmas tree truly reflects who we are. We seldom select a tall slender tree. It's usually a short "stocky" tree.

For a period of time our family was ecologically friendly and had an artificial tree. But one year when our daughter was probably 7 or 8, she cried out, "Why can't we get a real tree this year for Christmas?"

One of my best childhood memories were the years we had an aluminum Christmas tree with a color wheel. My brother would sit on the floor, for what seemed like hours, in amazement, as the tree changed colors from yellow to red to green to blue.

When Teresa and I are in our 80's we'll probably be looking for a ceramic tree that has various colored lights on the tips of the braches. They stand about a foot tall. We'll stick it on our dining room table as we look at each other while eating dinner.

When visiting in people's homes this time of year, what I enjoy is looking at their tree. In some cases there are homes with more than one tree. Every tree has a story and everyone has their own ideas for decorating it. There are trees which look like they were taken from the website of Neiman Markus. Every decoration appears to have been placed on the tree by the staff of Downton Abbey, measured with precision. There are trees with family mementoes maybe with decorations which have been handed down for generations.

As Teresa was busy doing something for school recently, this year Rachel and I decorated the family tree. We pulled out our collection of Christmas ornaments. In previous years there may have been a theme for the tree but this year, maybe just to complete the task, we pulled out the first ornaments we could see. There were ornaments Rachel made as a child. We found ornaments Teresa has received from piano students over the years, ornaments that were gifts from family and friends.

Some of the ornaments are worn or faded by

time, others may have been bent or chipped. As we hung them, Rachel and I laughed and remembered stories of the people who gave us the ornaments.

We also remembered the that ornaments didn't make it. There was the year Teresa and Rachel gingerbread make stars for our tree, HEAVY. LARGE.



gingerbread stars. At the time we had a Cocker Spaniel named Freckles. Teresa taught piano lessons in our home and as students entered the house, they had to walk by the tree. Freckles was very protective of that tree with the gingerbread men. He didn't want anyone getting too close to the tree. Any ornaments that fell to the ground were his.



As you decorate your tree, or when you decide to take it down, I hope you will remember your stories or create new traditions.

As we remember the Holy Family gathered that first Christmas, may we all have family traditions that help us capture earlier memories of why we celebrate this time of year.

# Journey In Faith Classes To Begin January 25

As we look ahead to Bishop Skirving's first Episcopal visit to St. Mary's in January of **2016**, at which time he will offer to **confirm** those Christians who are ready to make a mature confession of faith or **receive** confirmed members of other Christian traditions into the Episcopal Church, we are excited to announce the beginning of our preparatory programs: *Journey In Faith* and *Youth Journey in Faith*.

*Journey In Faith* is a series of interactive sessions with St. Mary's clergy & catechists through which members will explore the fundamentals of Christianity, Anglicanism, and the Episcopal Church.

Everyone is welcome to participate in *Journey in Faith* even if they have already been confirmed/received or are not sure if they desire to be. *Journey in Faith* is also an ideal program for anyone curious about baptism or joining St. Mary's.

An informational session for the adult course which covers the course outline and schedule will take place on Sunday, January 25, at 11:15 am in the parish Bookstore/Vestry Room. *Youth Journey in Faith* will meet during the Christian Formation hour throughout the year.

### ADULT CHRISTIAN FORMATION

This winter and spring we will be using lessons from "Whole Christianity", a book of instruction in the Teaching and Worship of the Episcopal Church., by The Rev. Hugh Edsall.

We will attempt to adhere to the following schedule but lessons may last longer than one week, based on discussion of the participants.

January 18th -This will be a foundational lesson of faith -We know many, who claim to be Christians and practice their religion all the time, who don't deal with these two important questions: *Is Belief in God Rational?* and *Is Jesus Who He Said He Is?* 

**January 25th** - *Wholeness: The Way Out of Chaos* - How can I be sure my church is teaching me the truth? How can I be sure that the Episcopal Church is for me?



### "My Name"

Jan 1 is the Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus & we'll renew our Baptismal vows on Jan 11, The Feast of the

Baptism of Jesus. Let this activity open up great conversations at home about our identity I Christ:

1 - Begin with a prayer like: "God, you have called us each by name, bless us in our conversation today. Amen."

2 - Read aloud these Bible passages: Luke 1:31-32 and 2:21.

3 - Invite each person to share what their names mean and how they were chosen. Learn meanings of names in a book or online at a place like babynames.com.

4 - If children are present, share how their names were chosen. How long did it take to decide? Who were the first to know their names? Be ready for "WHY?" questions! If there's a biblical connection to their names, share the passage as well.

5 - Read aloud 1 John 3:1.

6 - Share about the day of your baptism (what you remember or what you've been told). Do the same for the children if they are present. What did it feel like to become or have your child become a "child of God?" What was the day like? Who was present? How did you celebrate? How do you continue to celebrate this special day?!

Above all, enjoy your fellowship together and praise God for knowing us all by name!
